

"What Does a Church Library Mean?" Facilitated by Jimmy Hulsey

Why does a church have a library? I have known people, not at Hudson, who I can still hear asking, "We have the Bible. Isn't that all we need?'" But, when Christians realize that the Bible and the Christian faith are not a single, literal point of view on God, we have come to the library.

When Christians realize that Scripture requires that the Holy Spirit working with the community of faith in tandem need not merely to quote but to interpret God's Word, we have come to the library. When Christians realize that the diversity of voices in Scripture and across Christian faith represent angles of vision and not truth in concrete, we have come to the library.

When Christians are tired of burying our dead through conflict with one another and people of other religions; when mutual understanding strikes us as a better way than shouting slogans from behind walls of difference, we have come to the library.

When we as Christians lose any connection to the library of our faith, we are susceptible to those who want to use us for their causes, substituting their mottos and slogans and rallying cries for actual Christian confession of faith.

We need to repent in the library and once again practice faith seeking understanding. When we like the Ethiopian eunuch in Acts 8 realize that we need someone, a community of someones to help us understand our faith, we have come to the library.

If you have read this far, you may have guessed that our class is about, not only what's in the library, but what the library symbolizes to us. I invite you to join with me to discover both what's in our church library and how to make use of it and to rediscover that we are a people open to God with our hearts and minds.







# A New Artistic Addition to Westminster Hall



A number of years ago, Milner Presbyterian Church on New Bern Avenue in Raleigh closed. Hudson received a number of their members to our congregation. For everyone who joined Hudson we eventually received approximately \$35,000. The Session of Hudson allocated these funds to help upgrade Westminster Hall.

This past week we installed a stained glass window from Milner in Westminster Hall. In the upcoming weeks it will be lit and we will finally dedicate the upgraded hall to Christ and the future ministry we do in that space. The Presbyterian Church USA is a connectional denomination. We are so thankful to the members of Milner Presbyterian Church who joined our congregation. We are thrilled to honor their ministry with a section of Milner's stained glass in our fellowship hall. #### MATTHEW 25

# Matthew 25 Mini-Conference Report **WORKSHOP #4 - BY JOAN LESTER**

Since joining the PCUSA Matthew 25 movement in 2021, Hudson has focused on the goals of congregational vitality, eradicating systematic poverty, and dismantling structural racism. The Matthew 25 invitation focuses on Matthew 25:31-46, the parable of the sheep and goats in which Jesus makes clear, that what we do matters to God and how we treat others is important to God.

In January, Elders Joan Lester and Jay Cummins participated in the Atlanta Matthew 25 Summit. (Summary HERE.) New Hope Presbytery organized a follow up mini-conference in July featuring six PCUSA moderated workshops.

Pastor Mac, Joan, and Jay participated in the miniconference and will continue to report about their workshops in the Weekly Window over the next few weeks.



This week's report is by Joan Lester, about the workshop she attended, entitled "Rebecca **Barnes: Eradicating Systemic Poverty and Addressing Root** Causes of Hunger--The Church's Role".



Rebecca Barnes coordinates the Presbyterian Hunger Program, which addresses intersectional, underlying causes of hunger. She started with the church's seven assertions on poverty; these assertions summarize our MATTHEW 25 church's historic stance on poverty. They are on the web HERE.

Who in our society gets access to a leg up?

We discussed the church's role from the standpoint of Isaiah 58:6, Mark 3:37, and Matthew 25:37-40. We discussed the meaning of the "least of these," i.e. the least advantaged.

PCUSA developed a 40-page policy on poverty in 1996. Core principles are as follows:

- Be present with, listen to, and be led by those who live in impacted communities.
- Seek equity and diversity in leadership.
- Learn about systems, structures & practices that perpetuate poverty.

An excellent book about poverty is *Poverty by America*, by Matthew Desmond. He talks about fear of the other (the stranger).

We ended by discussing three organizations within NC that address poverty:

- **Operation Spring Plant**
- Fertile Ground Coop
- Oak City Cares
