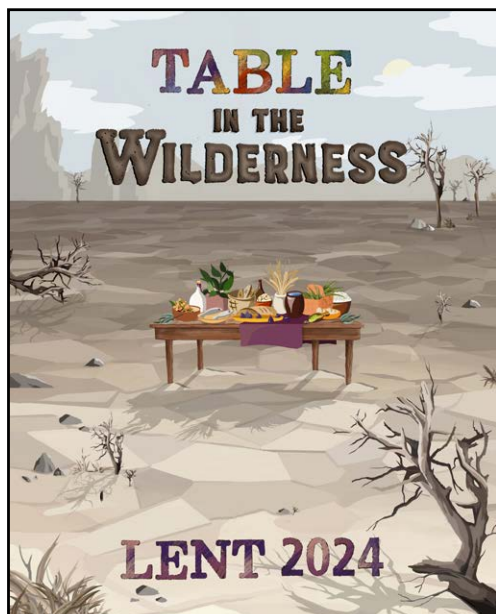

Natasha Vedder, a pastor in British Columbia writes, "Lent is a time to become more open to God through the vulnerabilities of life. It comes with an especially poignant invitation to join with others in bringing our doubts, fears, sorrow, loneliness, and dryness before God, hoping to taste God's promised provision in the deserts of life."

During the season of Lent, in worship we will be looking at scriptures where God faithfully provides nourishment for people in need. In the spirit of this, our theme is **A Table in the Wilderness**: An image of a place of welcome, rest and sustenance in the desert of life. When so much in life sucks us dry, how can we experience the quenching work of God to give us the strength, perseverance and hope to carry on? We encourage you to commit or re-commit to the rhythms of worship throughout Lent.

HMPC Deacons invite you to join them on Wednesdays for supper and worship during Lent--Practices that began with the early Christians who gathered to share a meal and fellowship, then worshiped together where the rites of anointing with oil and communion were offered. Your participation may be a regular part of your Lent commitment or you can attend as you are able. Each week we provide healthy, delicious, simple suppers and a time of fellowship around the tables in Westminster North. There is no cost for these meals. Following the meal, the service of evening prayer take place in the Chapel. These are contemplative, reflective times that include scripture, liturgy, several forms of prayer, music, and the opportunity to be anointed with oil for yourself or on behalf of someone else. The services conclude with the celebration of the Lord's Supper.

This Lenten season, we are providing the daily Lent devotional from *Presbyterian Outlook*, that invites you to explore and observe new and familiar

places in your community. What will God reveal to you when you pause, ponder and reflect?

A cemetery, a bar, a library, an emergency waiting room: what do all these places have in common?

In *Local Pilgrim*, Outlook Editor Teri McDowell Ott and other writers explore what God might reveal to us if we intentionally explore our communities. Who do we see? What do we hear? God reveals God's self when we look.

Lent is the perfect season for a pilgrimage such as this, leading to meaningful contemplation and sacred discoveries. Habitat for Humanity Interfaith Coalition Build 2024

This year we will once again be building at Old Poole Place neighborhood. This 105-home neighborhood is going up near the intersection of Old Poole Road and New Hope Road in Southeast Raleigh, and will feature 60 single-family homes and 45 townhomes, all built by Habitat. We are excited to add to the number of homes we built there last year!



Old Poole Place is the largest community Habitat Wake has built from raw land. Building multiple houses in the same community helps cut down

on transportation costs and infrastructure development. It creates efficiencies in the building schedule and material procurement and maximizes staff and volunteer resources. This contributes significantly to our ability to build these homes more affordably. Having an entire neighborhood of Habitat homebuyers contributes significantly to its long-term stability and that of the entire community.

This year there are several changes that we are excited about: One is the emphasis on advocacy that addresses systems, policies and practices that keep everyone from having affordable housing. As faith communities who care about people at every stage of the continuum of housing challenges, we are asked to advocate for affordable housing for those who are experiencing homelessness, those in transitional housing, those for whom the market value of rent is unattainable and those who are able to work toward home ownership through Habitat.

The other change is that for the first time the Interfaith Coalition will be partnering with another group, the Southwest Wake Faith Coalition, and together we will construct two homes next door to each other! We are excited about building with new friends who are especially interested in getting to know about our Coalition, one of the few Interfaith Builds in the country.

The Spring Old Poole Place Build is a building and advocacy campaign to advance a more beloved community with justice, equal opportunity, and love

for all. The Spring Old Poole Place Build will begin on March 9, 2024, and will continue through June 1, 2024. We will start and finish 2 new homes and help to finish other homes underway in the Old Poole Place neighborhood. We will also advance Habitat Wake's advocacy campaigns during this build such as the establishment of the Affordable Housing Acquisition Fund for Wake County, gaining support for the Affordable Knightdale Plan, and efforts to preserve vulnerable affordable housing.

Important dates for those interested:

- **Kick-Off Ceremony/ Wall Build at the Construction Warehouse and Wall Raising On Site:** Saturday, March 9 (2 shifts, half-day each)
- **On Site Construction (full days):** Saturday, April 27 and Saturday, May 18. There will be 5-6 volunteers from each scheduled build group.



We will be working with volunteers from 31 other faith communities, Habitat staff, AmeriCorps volunteers and homebuyers. Those of us who have participated find this to be one of the

most meaningful opportunities for hands-on mission that contributes directly to the long-term solution of providing affordable and safe housing for everyone. **For questions or more information contact Debbie Kirk dkirk@hmpe.org**

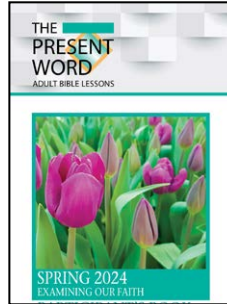
Learn About David LaMotte

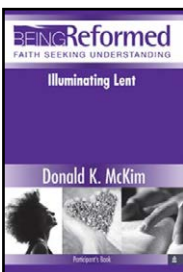

What is Christ calling you to through the passage?

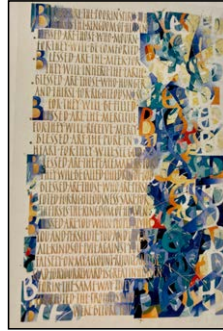

Monday, February 26 at Noon

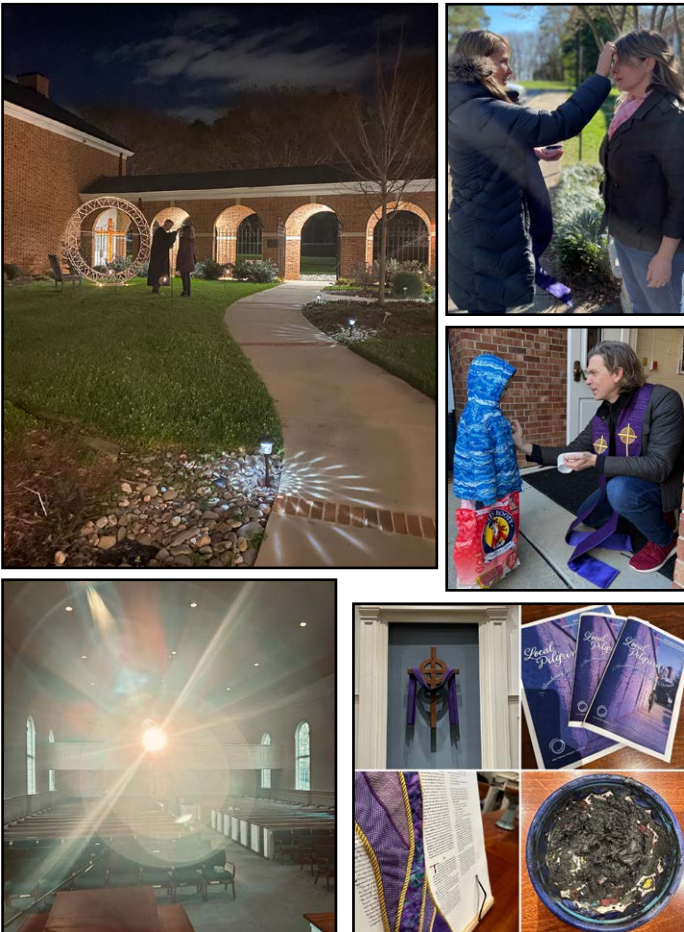

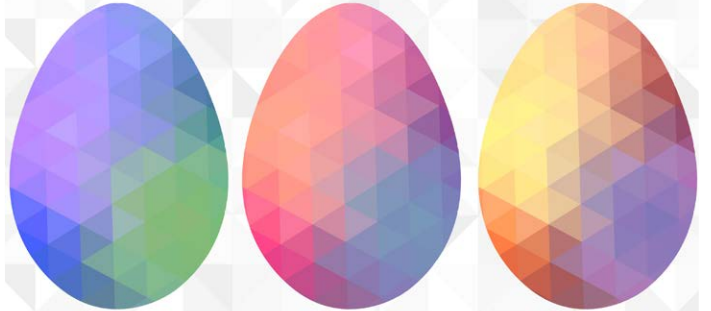
