This month we are collecting diapers, pull-ups, and wipes for Diaper Train. No family should have to worry about how they will afford their next diaper, yet this is the reality for 1 in 2 families. For more than 10 years, Diaper Train has been committed to improving the lives of children and families in Wake County by providing direct access to diapers, ultimately working to end diaper poverty. Their greatest need is 4, 5, & 6 diapers, 3T/4T & 4T/5T pull ups, and wipes, but they will accept any size diaper including opened packages (wipes must be unopened). Please bring your donations to church by Sunday, May 26th, or you may drop off your donation during the week to the church office throughout the month of May. 

HMPC LIBRARY

For The Library: A Collection Of Early Essays By Karl Barth, A Twentieth Century Theologian BY JIMMY HULSEY

When Karl Barth, who for ten years was the pastor of a small congregation in Switzerland, came out with a commentary on Romans (1919, 1922), he shook the theological world of Germany. Barth likened the reaction he got to a mistake he once made in the church belfry when he accidentally pulled the rope of the steeple bell and alerted the whole village. Three of the major theology professors of Germany, two of his teachers, rebuked his work, mincing no words. But his voice in Romans had alerted the town in a way that resonated to many people. Why? And why did this sow the seeds for Barth's strong opposition to Adolf Hitler in 1934? More on 1934 later.



For now, the essays in *The Word* of God and the Word of Man ('man' was the way they referred to all humanity back then) need to be set in a context. "The Problem of Ethics Today" is a critical chapter in the book. It might help us to imagine that, as Barth wrote, he was viewing the question of ethics as he surveyed the trenches of World War I.

This was once thought to be "the war to end all wars." But instead, it left human ideals in a frightful heap of the dead. Following Barth, if this is the cemetery of human efforts to do good, then is it not logical to turn our focus from humanity to God? Rather than

our viewing God through the lens of what we need and want, why don't we begin to read Scripture from the perspective of what God thinks and expects of us? Another chapter in the 'Collection' is entitled "The Strange New World in the Bible." It was a call to a fresh read of the Bible, different than much of the theological world of Europe which Barth characterized as "speaking of God by talking about humanity in a loud voice." In his view, that had gotten western civilization into the trenches.

In essence, Barth viewed the misbegotten efforts of humanity as glorifying our endeavors to change the world rather than submitting our plans and efforts to God's judgment. When truly judged by God's Word, we find ourselves in need of grace. And God in Christ is not stingy with grace.

Of course, when we focus too much on God, the doers and shakers within us get nervous. 'You are asking us or encouraging us to do nothing in the face of so much that is wrong.' Barth faced this reply in his day, and his response was simply, 'where did that get us?' He might reply today that 'only when we review our plans and efforts to change the world in the light of our need for God's grace, can we properly see our neighbor's wounds and our own wounds in those of our neighbor. Then we start from a different place to act as Christ's emissaries to heal and to reconcile.' Of course, this is merely my take on reading Barth. Perhaps you may have a better one.
